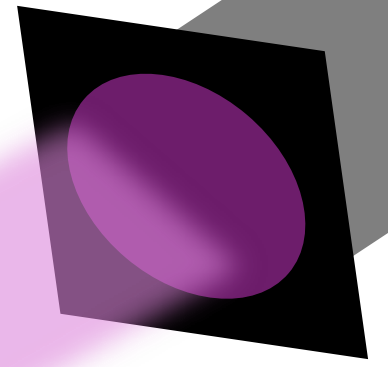

**Child Sexual Abuse in
the family environment**

In this Spotlight...

The focus of this edition of the Children's MARS Spotlight is Child Sexual Abuse in the Family Environment.

Child sexual abuse in the family environment is defined as sexual abuse perpetrated or facilitated in or out of the home, against a child under the age of 18, by a family member, or someone otherwise linked to the family context or environment, whether or not they are a family member.

Within this definition, perpetrators may be close to the victim (for example, father, uncle, stepfather, sibling) or less familiar (family friend, neighbour, babysitter). Less commonly, perpetrators can also be female, such as mother, aunt, cousin or stepmother, which is often overlooked.

Key messages for practice

Sibling sexual abuse is thought to be the most common form of intra-familial child sexual abuse – three times more common than abuse by a parent

Children need help to communicate what is happening when it comes to verbally disclosing sexual abuse. It is important that we recognise that we are as integral to the disclosure process as the child themselves, and we can support children even without a verbal disclosure. The knowledge required to do this is not 'expert' or 'specialist', and all professionals need access to it

BAME and LGBT+ children and young people, those with disabilities and boys all face additional barriers to their abuse coming to light

Interventions that focus on the whole family as well as the individual child are important. Children and young people often feel responsible for the distress of their family in the aftermath of sexual abuse, and this can be reduced through providing support to non-abusing family members
