Children's MARS subgroup updates

Key Updates - Children's Help and Protection Pathway (CHaPP) Group

- The Partnership Integrated Triage (PITSTOP) continues to be successful in ensuring early help for families from the right agency and reducing the number of children who need to be considered within the social work 'front door'
- Early help assessments continue to be undertaken and logged on the DASH system, with increasing numbers showing sustained commitment to this process particularly from schools, settings and the RDaSH 0-19 Health and Wellbeing Service
- The CHaPP received progress updates in relation to partnership groups/ initiatives including reducing parental conflict, graded care profile 2, emotional wellbeing and mental health, and risk outside the home

Key Updates - Early Help Strategic Leads Group (EHSLG)

- Following consultation with schools, colleges and settings, the early help assessment and plan has been re-designed. As part of our commitment to co-produce, the draft format is being fine-tuned with parents and family members, and 'trialled' in two schools in preparation for the final model being launched over the summer period
- Bespoke task and finish groups have been held to review the capabilities of the DASH system for logging early help assessments and to review the North Lincolnshire role of the lead professional descriptor
- Early help locality network meetings are an important feature of the North Lincolnshire system, with termly meetings held in each locality for a number of years, providing an opportunity for practitioners to meet with schools, family support and other local authority staff to share best practice and seek solutions. The format for these forums has been refreshed to provide opportunity for receiving service updates and encouraging greater connectivity around impact and outcomes as well as continuing to enable peer support and the sharing of best practice

Key Updates - Safeguarding Practice Learning and Improvement Group (SPLIG)

- The SPLIG received updates on recent scrutiny and assurance activity including the thematic assurance event on the harmful sexual behaviour and the multi-agency case audit practice learning line of sight event on child sexual abuse in the family environment
- The SPLIG reflected on the learning from the Child Safeguarding Practice Review report 'The Myth of Invisible Men'
- An evaluation report of the Yorkshire and Humber Multi-Agency Safeguarding Trainers (YHMAST) domestic abuse webinar series was presented to the SPLIG
- The SPLIG considered and agreed the 'Shine a Light' areas of focus for 2022/23 which would be posited to the safeguarding partners for endorsement

Partnership Group Updates

Learning from practice

Practice Learning Line of Sight event - Child sexual abuse in the family environment

A multi-agency case audit practice learning line of sight event took place in March 2022.

Good practice and key learning include:

- Cases involving child sexual abuse are complex, however the values and principals of the One Family Approach are being demonstrated within practice. There was evidence of relational working and the practitioners supporting the family were the best persons to do the work. In both cases, the children were supported to remain in their home, in their school and in their community
- The use of family solutions was evident in that wider family members were involved in the plan
